Thoughts from the **General Manager & Board of Directors**



50 years ago on February 1, 1969, Santa Barbara MTD's public transit service began operation with 12 buses and 6 routes. Since then we've grown with our community, and now have 112 buses serving 42 routes.

As we move into our next 50 years, we are continuing to innovate, aim high, and provide the robust and customercentric service that keeps thousands of riders coming back every day.

Our new EVs are MTD's first foray toward achieving MTD's goal of transitioning to an all-electric fleet by 2030. This is an ambitious goal, but one that's consistent with the South Coast's tradition of environmental stewardship.

While we have started to receive our first 10 buses with MTD's new branding and colors, funding to replace our entire fleet is insufficient to always replace old with new. Vehicle refurbishment, drivetrain replacements, and asset swaps with larger transit agencies are ways we're stretching the public dollar. This year we lowered the average age of our overall fleet, reduced emissions, and expanded the fleet to provide First/Last Mile service to support the re-timed Amtrak commuter service.

After 50 years, we are excited about the future of public transit on the South Coast as we press forward with new innovative programs to enhance mobility in our region.



Fleet Upgrades

100% zero-emissions by 2030

In November, the Board of Directors adopted a goal of a 100 percent zeroemissions fleet by 2030. This ambitious goal would get us to an all batteryelectric fleet 10 years earlier than the recently-adopted state mandate. This goal adoption comes on the heels of the official introduction of MTD's new 30' electric vehicles that serve as replacements for the custom electric shuttles MTD has operated since the early 90s. These vehicles provide greater range and capacity, and get MTD on the road to full electrification.

Newly-branded fleet arrives


10 new 40' Gillig buses began arriving in January of 2019 with a newly-branded livery. The blue and teal colors of MTD's new logo evoke the coastal themes of our South Coast region. They also feature MTD's first vinyl seating for the 40' fleet

Fiscally responsible fleet manaaement

In 2018, MTD purchased 17 12-year old 40' buses with air conditioning from San Mateo Transit District to replace 20-year old 40' buses. In a financially prudent move, MTD reduced the average age of its overall fleet, reduced its emissions and expanded its fleet to provide First / Last Mile service to support the re-timed Amtrak train service from Ventura County.



Facility Improvements

MTD has received permits and construction bids and will soon begin extensive renovations on the Downtown Santa Barbara Transit Center. This project is expected to last 8 to 9 months, and temporary facilities and boarding zones will be in place for the duration of the project. The completed project will feature a new driveway, brighter lighting, new landscaping, and a completely revamped interior sure to enhance passenger comfort.

Technological Advances

Mobile-friendly and bilingual, MTD's new website launched in early 2018. Featuring real-time arrival information and dynamic maps, the website complements the suite of our BusTracker smartphone app and texting feature which continues to grow in popularity, with nearly 14,000 app downloads and 15,000 unique text subscribers.

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The District has also begun a Facilities Master Plan process, assessing our space needs and planning for fleet electrification. After leasing to a tenant for the past 15 years, MTD's property on Overpass Road in Goleta will soon be used for operations again. The reopening of the Overpass facility will eventually allow for a reduction in emissions and deadhead miles as buses serving some Goleta and Isla Vista routes will be able to originate from a much closer location.

New website

No more stickers

New farebox technology and extensive testing has culminated in the full implementation of smartcard integration with UCSB and SBCC student ID cards. Instead of needing to pick up a registration sticker every quarter or semester, students in good standing simply tap their ID card on the farebox when boardina.
